A LETTER TO THE EDITOR: A SIGEP HERO

In times of crisis, we commonly celebrate heroes who rise to the occasion and act selflessly for the benefit of others. During this novel pandemic, we have considered health care workers, essential workers, and first responders to be heroes of the day. However, from a company called TechPoint based in Indiana, another hero has been detected. Its name is Covid Hero.

Covid Hero is an app designed by our SigEp brother, Shreedhar Pandey, and a team of four other college engineering students from schools located in Indiana. I recently interviewed Shreedhar about his summer experience. According to Pandey, this project was an internship/challenge sponsored by TechPoint. He described, "There were nine topics in total about COVID-19. Our team was in the category 'COVID-19 Detection'." Pandey functioned as the Project Manager and the Software Engineer on his team. Not only did he organize and facilitate weekly task meetings, but he also worked on many of the physical properties of the app. Pandey remarks, "I was responsible for taking the prototype and making an actual product out of it. I implemented the authentication system, settings, home page, and restaurants/businesses page." So, what is Covid Hero? What does it offer and why should people use this app?

Covid Hero is the result of this challenge: "Identify a solution to regularly test/monitor Indiana's citizens, quickly identify hotspots, and enable contact tracing and other measures to mitigate and limit further outbreaks." Pandey's team certainly met the challenge when they developed this multi-faceted app. Like many resources currently on the internet, Covid Hero reports COVID-19 cases, positivity rate, and deaths within the user's county on the home page. But this is just the beginning of the app's capabilities. It utilizes GPS technology to alert individuals when they enter a COVID-19 "hot zone". Pandey pointed out that when traveling to new places, it is critical to be aware of local coronavirus conditions in order to be safe and well prepared. Additionally, there is a page dedicated to reviewing businesses and restaurants. Customers can add public safety reviews of the businesses they visit which will be visible to all other app users. Pandey articulated that the two goals of this feature are to assign businesses with an average COVID-19 safe rating and to give businesses an incentive to follow COVID-19 guidelines. Finally, the app has a built-in system that predicts COVID-19 cases in Indiana counties using specific al-Covid Hero aims to be a "one-stop-shop" for COVID-19 regorithms. sources.

Aside from the technology, I asked **Pandey** about his experience working on a team of students representing different universities from around the state, especially considering the complications of collaborating in a strictly virtual environment. He responded with remarkable positivity. "Even though this was a remote internship, we found it pretty easy to communicate because of Zoom, email, and regular meetings," he said. "I think the virtual meetings became our advantage because we could meet at any time and it was really flexible." He expressed his gratitude at this opportunity to work with such talented peers and to network with encouraging coaches and mentors.

Finally, I asked **Pandey** to describe the impact this research opportunity had on him. His answer should make the Valparaiso University SigEp community proud. "My biggest takeaway would be that it was great to be able to create a product that can make a difference in people's lives. In these tough times that we are facing now, I saw a beam of hope." During this pandemic when bad news seems to be around every corner, **Pandey's** "beam of hope" is a refreshing relief. "Even the smallest thing, done wholeheartedly, matters." I think that **Pandey** is saying that we can all find opportunities to be heroes.




