

SLACKLINING Doc Janowiak

During my summer vacation, one of the most exciting and enjoyable detours from everyday life on which I embarked was my four-day trip to Breathe Fest, a selfbilled "slackline and discovery festival," in Spencer, Indiana, during the weekend following the Fourth of July. Slacklining is a sport in which participants anchor a strip of webbing (like the ratcheted tie-downs used for adhering cargo to trailers) between two points, normally trees, and walk and bounce on the line like a tightrope. The name of the sport comes from the 'slack' in the setup, which allows the line to act almost as a onedimensional trampoline, enabling a wide range of tricks to be performed in addition to the already impressivelooking feat of balancing oneself at all. In reality, the feat is not so great as it seems. With a few days of steady practice, one improves quickly. In addition to the hundreds of slacklines set up in the woods where the festival was held, there were also workshops teaching many other so-called "flow sports," such as 'acro-yoga.' This involves traditional yoga stretches, but performed with a partner in frozen balances, usually with one person climbing over another, and their partner holding

them up. My friends and I, like most of the festival's attendees, made camp in the woods on festival grounds, staying in tents and eating traditional camp fare, cooked over open fires or portable propane stoves. At the entrance to the festival grounds was a muck-filled pond referred to by regulars as the "party pond." A two-kilometre hike north led to the "back lake," a more expansive and much cleaner body of water likely formed as a result of melting glaciers thousands of years ago. The most impressive and engaging event of the festival was the celebratory show on Friday night which felt reminiscent of a paleolithic feast, Celtic pagan harvest ritual, or, to some, the recent horror film Midsommar. A strong and loud, thumping drum rhythm was the pulsing heartbeat of the celebration. Concentric rings of festival-goers danced around bonfires which stretched endlessly into the sky. Slacklines were set alight, and some brave few walked across them with bare feet. The atmosphere was electric, but it was also a very serene ambience, with strong ties of community and camaraderie permeating the entire ordeal, and a deep, abiding appreciation for the Earth and for nature. For myself and those who came with me, this will certainly be a summer to remember.






